COURSE OBJECTIVES

Covering the period from the end of the Reformation era (ca. the Thirty Years War, 1618-1648) to the present day, this course will cover

1. The impact of significant trends upon theology and the church, such as
 - a. the Enlightenment and Age of Reason
 - b. the Great Awakening leading to the modern missionary movement
 - c. challenges from Darwinism, higher criticism, and the ecumenical movement
2. The key leaders and events of this period which made a mark on the modern church

COURSE OUTCOMES

1. The student will be able to relate the historical framework out of which emerged friends and foes of today's church
2. The student will master major dynamics that have shaped the modern western church
3. The student will be able to distinguish the traits of modern churches within the stream of historical Christianity as opposed to traits of modernist or faddish churches
