

**OT HISTORICAL NARRATIVES
COURSE REQUIREMENTS
Spring 2022**

COURSE OVERVIEW

Survey of Joshua through Nehemiah. Period of the conquest, the judges, monarchy, exile and restoration; geography of Eretz-Israel; the covenantal-contextual relationship to the socio-political milieu.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- In pursuit of a better mastery of God's Word, objective number one is to learn the usefulness and place of the OT Historical books within the larger canon. To that end there will be some focus on 1) the gospel content within the context of the Mosaic covenant and in the introduction of the Davidic covenant; and 2) the establishment of God's people in the Promised Land as the beginning of the fulfillment of the covenantal promises to the fathers.
- Objective number two is to master the introductory backgrounds of each book in this section, and to understand these books' inter-connectedness in the flow of sacred history.

COURSE OUTCOMES

- The ability to relate the content, structure, purpose, and canonical importance of each of the various books within this section of Scripture;
- The ability to communicate the theology of the historical books in preaching and counseling as revealed in the art of OT narrative and the record of sacred history.

RESEARCH PROJECT

- A 10-12 page term paper due May 2 with a topic submitted by April 25. Bibliography should include at least five non-general reference works not found on the internet; facts and quotes need to be documented following a standard college format (e.g., SBL style).
- Plan on sharing your findings with the class in a 10+ minute report.
