COURSE INFORMATION

Course description

Special introduction to the Acts of the Apostles and to the Pauline epistles; survey of the history of the critical study of Paul; outline and chronology of Paul's life and ministry; historical and theological relation of Acts to various passages of the Pauline epistles.

Course objectives

The purpose of this course is to enable the student to be able to summarize the life of Paul, to explain its chronology, and to be able to identify the important events of his life, along with the primary scholarly interpretations of those events and the reasons for them. You also will be able to explain the background, purpose, and basic content of each of the Pauline epistles.

Course outcomes

By successfully completing this course, you will be able to do the following:

1. Present a detailed outline of Paul's life, including his missionary journeys and the writing of his epistles.
2. Teach the life of Paul, using a map to show the places he lived in and visited.
3. Understand and be able to teach the main points of each of Paul's epistles, including the circumstances of their writing and their relevance to Paul's day and to ours.
4. Defend the Pauline authorship of all of his epistles, particularly those that have been attacked.
5. Explain the significance of Paul for the history of the early church and the significance of the Gentile mission.
6. Adequately answer questions relating to Paul and his epistles in an ordination examination before a presbytery.
7. By intensely studying Paul's life and epistles, you will obtain the necessary background for a lifetime of study and teaching from Paul's life and epistles. Also, we trust, you will grow spiritually to a greater love and appreciation for Paul and for Paul's Lord.

Reading

The following works are required reading for the course:

- New Testament: Acts, Pauline epistles (Romans – Philemon)

- Appropriate chapters of a standard New Testament introduction (choose one):

Approximately half of the required reading is due the week before the midterm exam, and the other half is due the week before the final exam, according to the schedule given below.

Geography of Paul's life – Bible atlas

In addition to the required reading texts, you will need to obtain the *Holman Quick Source Bible Atlas*. Bring this atlas to class, as we will be referring to it frequently during class lectures and discussions. Each student will be expected to be able to locate on a map of the Mediterranean world the important cities Paul lived in and visited, and the various routes he took on his journeys

Examinations

There will be two examinations, a midterm and a final. These examinations will be taken from the Study Questions and will cover the material in the class notes. The midterm will cover questions #1-50, and the final will cover #51-104.

Grading

The final grade for this class will be determined as follows:

- Midterm examination 30%
- Final examination 30%
- Reading assignments 30%
- Attendance & participation 10%
